course description

Explores images of the American West through film, literature, history, art, photography, and other cultural productions, to understand how these images reflected and shaped American identities, ideologies, and mythologies. Through films, novels, and other supplementary readings, examines the intertwined themes of progress, civilization, region, nation, democracy, race, gender, and violence.

about the instructor

I'm a historian of twentieth century popular culture, media, and religion with a fascination for the American West. I have also taught (or will be teaching this year) courses on radio in American culture, American religious pluralism, early American history, women's history, and Native American history. I've published several books and articles about radio, particularly religious broadcasting, and am working on a book about the United Nations in American culture and domestic politics. I welcome comparisons with Westerns that we haven't screened together, so it will benefit you immensely if you take the time to see a few other Westerns outside of class on your own (the summer list is posted as "Western Wiki" on Moodle, open for our collective revision and comment).

syllabus/ course outline

Consider this deep irony: the decades that created the "classic" film image of the American West also saw increasing federalization, environmental degradation, rapid urban growth, and border-crossing, completely altering the West at the same time that its mythic images were being cemented in American cinema and art. We will explore both image and reality in the American West, consider the power of the concept of the American frontier by looking at 19th century realities, 20th century cinematic reconstructions, and 20th century social change, cultural realities, and peoples of the crossroads region(s) west of the Mississippi.

This course takes an integrative approach to the region, using history, literature, art, geography, cultural and media studies to unpack the meaning—past, present, and future—of the American West. This approach will help frame the films and your understanding of how the West has been represented (and re-presented) in the public imagination. It is not meant to be a comprehensive course, and so will jump around a bit in time and topic, hopefully touching on many key topics, characters, places, and ideas and exploring a few of those in depth throughout the semester.
